UTILITY CREW LEADER

Definition/Summary

Under general supervision, the Utility Crew Leader classification performs the full range of maintenance, installation, and repair assignments with minimal supervision and training, and provides coordination and work direction for a field crew and training for less experienced staff.

Essential Functions

- Operates backhoes, loaders, trucks and hand equipment in the uncovering of water main and service lines for installation, maintenance or repair.
- Performs a variety of unskilled and semiskilled tasks in line and meter installation.
- Backfills and repairs paving; operates Muller boring machine, air compressor, road boring machine, scope pipe locator, valve locator, roller vibrator, tamper, jackhammer.
- Acts as crew leader on maintenance crew.
- During inclement weather, assists in equipment maintenance and repair, and in general yard and shop work.
- Assists in construction and maintenance work on District property.
- Inspects new pipeline projects for proper service line installation.
- Arranges and directs meter installations.
- Responsible for safe and proper conduct of the members of their crew in the performance of their duties.
- Establish and maintain cooperative working relationships with co-workers, outside agencies, and the public.
- Regular attendance and adherence to prescribed work schedule to conduct job responsibilities.

Other Duties:

- Shuts down main lines in emergencies.
- Distributes customer notices.
- Performs other duties as assigned.

Job Standards/ Specifications

Knowledge of:

- Operation and use of a variety of light and moderately heavy motorized and power construction equipment.
- Methods and materials used in water line installation and repair.
- Proper work safety standards.
- Principles and practices of work direction, coordination, and training.

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Ability to:

- Skillfully use a backhoe and other equipment in the uncovering, installation and repair of water lines.
- Effectively direct, instruct, train, and evaluate subordinates in maintenance and construction activities.
- Perform a variety of semiskilled work in general construction and maintenance.
- Perform strenuous manual labor, often in inclement weather.
- Meet with customers pertaining to District-Customer relations, conforming to District policies and good public relations; the satisfying of problems that may arise in a congenial and amiable manner.
- Follow oral and written directions.

Typical Physical Activities

- Operates District vehicles and heavy equipment used in construction, maintenance, and repair work.
- Must be able to carry, push, pull, reach and lift equipment, parts and material weighing up to 60 pounds daily and up to 100 pounds weekly.
- Stoops, kneels, crouches, crawls, climbs and grasps during field maintenance and repair work.
- Works in an environment with exposure to dust, dirt, mud, water and significant temperature changes between cold and heat.
- Communicates orally with District staff in face-to-face, one-to-one settings.
- Regularly uses a telephone for communication.
- Stands and walks for extended time periods.
- Hearing, vision and eye-hand coordination sufficient to operate heavy equipment foot and hand controls and to maintain good awareness during maintenance and construction jobs.

Environmental Factors

- 1. Exposure to the sun: 50% to 100% work time spent outside a building and exposed to the sun.
- 2. Work above floor level: Some work done on ladders or other surfaces from 4 to 12 feet above the ground.
- 3. High temp: Considerable work time in hard manual labor in temperatures between 80-90 degrees.
- 4. Humidity: Work in areas with unusually high humidity.
- 5. Wetness: More than 10% of the work time getting part or all of the body and/or clothing wet.
- 6. Noise: Occasionally, there are unusually loud sounds.
- 7. Slippery Surfaces: Occasional work on unusually slippery surfaces.
- 8. Oil: Some parts of the body in contact with oil or grease occasionally.
- 9. Dust: Works in an around areas with minor amounts of dust.
- 10. Irregular or extended work hours: Occasionally required to change working hours or work overtime.

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Desirable Qualifications

Any combination of education and experience that would likely provide the necessary knowledge and abilities is qualifying.

A typical way to obtain the knowledge and abilities would be:

Experience: Two years' experience in the operation of light and medium motorized construction equipment.

Education: High school diploma or the equivalency thereof sufficient to assure the ability to read and write at the level required for successful job performance.

<u>License Certificate Registration Requirement</u>

Driver License: Possession of a valid California Class A Driver's License issued by the State Department of Motor Vehicles. Possession and proof of a good driving record free of multiple or serious traffic violations or accidents for two (2) consecutive years.

Possession of a State of California, Department of Health Services Water Distribution Operator Certification Grade D-1.
